II. Approval of/Additions to the Agenda

Comm. Gordon requested an additional item to the agenda under VII, consideration of a letter to the Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee. Comm. Fowler moved and Comm. Cote seconded approving the agenda with this addition. The motion was approved unanimously.

III. Approval of January 20, 2016 Annual General Membership Meeting Minutes

Comm. Fowler moved and Comm. Cote seconded approving the minutes from the Board of Directors' meeting on January 20, 2016. The motion was passed unanimously.

IV. Old Business

A. Discussion of a Comprehensive Approach to Corrections Issues

The group discussed encouraging county representatives to attend upcoming public hearings and workshops involving jail legislation. Sheriffs are likely to be present and more county government officials should be in the room to answer questions and provide data. Each county has been impacted differently by the jail funding shortfall and it's important to have county people knowledgeable about the budget in attendance to explain how the distributed funds have been used as well as the ramifications of the lack of adequate funding. Committee members need to understand that commissioners have the final fiscal authority. The group reviewed the letter draft handed out at the beginning of the meeting. Comm. Fowler moved that a letter from MCCA be sent to both Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee and the Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee members. Bill Whitten added that Comm. Baldacci should sign the letter. Comm. Cote seconded the motion and it was approved unanimously. MCCA staff will publicize the next committee meeting.

This summer the group will work on strategies to develop new legislation for the next full session. The tax caps should be reevaluated using realistic numbers and each county will need provide documentation to support the need to change the current formula.

Executive Director Rosemary Kulow presented her reports. <u>Comm. Cote made a motion to approve the Executive Director's Report and the Financial Report as written. Comm. Joy seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.</u>

The group reviewed the wording on the supplemental jail funding request, the updated L.D. status chart and LD/LR list. Public hearings are scheduled for 1473 Resolve, To Increase Access to Opiate Addiction Treatment in Maine and 1496 An Act To Support Maine People in Recovery.

D. Association Reports

EMAD: Sean Goodwin - No report was given.

MACCAM: Bill Collins reported the group is working on restitution accounts, some counties moving to a "no cash" policy. Another complication is currently the DOC collects money for prisoners, but upon release, the responsibility goes back to the county, making it difficult to reconcile.

MACT: David Parkman continued on the prior subject mentioning that Waldo has changed to check or money orders receiving only \$15 in cash of the \$2,000 total payments from January to February 2016.

MECCA: Owen Smith mentioned the NINA conference in May. Gordon Graham will present sessions on risk management topics.

E. Corrections Report

Comm. Cote reported that the Jail Standards Board has collaborated well, completing their task of combining redundant standards and omitting obsolete standards.

F. Annual Convention Report

The Convention Planning Committee Meeting will meet on February 12th at the Hilton Garden Inn Bangor to enjoy a food tasting. The \$200 deposit will be submitted at that time.

G. NACo Report

Comm. Baldacci spoke about attending the upcoming 2016 NACo Legislative Conference with MCCA representative Comm. McGrane and Executive Director Rosemary Kulow February 20-24 in Washington, DC.

One of the important topics is the loss of healthcare benefits for people who are arrested. Currently, inmates lose their Federal healthcare benefits regardless of whether they are convicted of a crime. Upon release the person needs to re-apply for coverage. The goal is to have coverage continue for jail inmates until and unless they are convicted of a crime and sentenced to a prison term.

Addressed to the Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee

Ladies and Gentlemen, as we move forward with testimony on County Jail funding, we must clear away the confusion as to whom within the State's County government structure is fiscally responsible for the budgeting and funding of all County programs including the jails; by statue¹, it is the County Commissioners.

With that focus, it then becomes incumbent upon our two parties, your Committee and our Commissioners through the MCCA, to negotiate an understanding of the essential funding required for the requisite incarcerations mandated by State law and judicial sentencipal.

This is not to suggest that you may neither solicit nor use the additional information from other appropriate parties and sources, it is conly suggest that when the topic of funding programs under the age of the county Commissioners is brought forth you negotiate with them, as they be the only County body that may be held fiscally a countable. To do otherwise, tacitly removes that responsibility from their carge on that issue with the public.



¹ Title 30 – a, §102. County commissioners' authority

The county commissioners have final authority over the operation of all county offices by elected or appointed county officials, except in circumstances for which a County Personnel Board has been established under subchapter VII, article 2 with the powers and duties set forth in that article and in section 501. The county commissioners must act as a board and not on an individual basis in exercising this authority.

February 2016 Financial Report

Attached please find the monthly financial reports for the month of February 2016. The Balance Sheet shows total assets and liabilities at \$260,646.02. Debits to the bank account in February totaled \$14,528, and \$140,266 income was deposited in the bank account. All membership dues have been received. A money market account was established at Camden National Bank for the surplus MainePERS funds to be used for future contributions to employee retirement benefits. \$152,729.61 was deposited into the account on February 10th leaving the 2016 budgeted amount of \$6,500 in the checking account for payments this year. The bank balance on February 29th was \$109,308.58; two payments totaling \$1,597.17 had not yet cleared the bank by the end of the month.

With about 16% of the year complete, \$140,392 (55.67%) of the \$252,150 budgeted revenue had been received by February 29th.

On the expenditure side, \$31,255 (12.39%) was expended by the end of February. See the *Profit & Loss Budget vs. Actual Month Only* report for details of revenue and expenditures for February 2016.

Finances are within budget, and there are no problems in any line item at this time. Please don't hesitate to let me know if you have any questions or would like to see anything different in the financial reports.

Legislative Documents (LDs):

LD 166 - An Act To Allow York County To Better Provide Rescue and Ambulance Services - SLG

SUPPORT – LPC voted unanimously to support Rep. Greenwood's amendment for the Minority Report that would allow all counties, rather than just York County, to provide regional ambulance service. **Committee voted OTP-AM**

This bill allows *all* counties to provide rescue services pursuant to the law governing county provision of ambulance services.

<u>LD 195 – An Act Regarding County Jails</u> – CJPS SUPPORT if used to request \$2,465,896 supplemental funding for jails. Sponsor - Senator Paul T. Davis

This bill allows the county jails to apply savings from the county's correctional budget to jail debt service without a reduction in payments from the State Board of Corrections. Committee voted ONTP & will introduce new Resolve via a bill to request \$2.466 million per year supplemental funding for jails from the AFA. Watch for the new bill & subsequent public hearing and work sessions.

LD 440 - An Act To Create a Secure, Therapeutic Mental Health Unit - CJPS OPPOSE

This bill provides for the establishment of a secure, therapeutic mental health unit for defendants undergoing court-ordered assessments to determine their competency to stand trial or their criminal culpability and to provide therapeutic care for forensic patients. The bill establishes the unit as follows:

- 1. It directs the Commissioner of Corrections and the Commissioner of Health and Human Services to enter into an agreement to establish the unit with the sheriff of either Cumberland County or Somerset County.
- 2. It directs the Department of Corrections to provide security for the unit. Security staff must be dedicated to the unit and trained to provide security in a mental health hospital environment.
- 3. It directs the Department of Corrections to provide therapeutic mental health care for the unit. The therapeutic mental health care must meet standards established by a national organization on correctional facilities mental health standards. The Department of Health and Human Services may also provide mental health services to the unit upon agreement with the Department of Corrections and the county jail.
- 4. It requires that the population in a secure, therapeutic mental health unit be separated by sight and sound from the general jail population.
- 5. It specifies that a person under a court order to undergo a mental evaluation by the State Forensic Service must be admitted to the unit unless the Department of Health and Human Services determines that the person's mental health condition contraindicates admittance to the unit, the person is an inmate at a state correctional facility or there is not a suitable bed available. WS 10:30 am, Monday, February 29-Divided Report

<u>LD 890 An Act To Ensure a Continuing Home Court for Cases Involving Children</u> Presented by Representative Monaghan of Cape Elizabeth, and cosponsored by Representative Gideon, Hobbins, McCreight, and Noon. – **JUD** - *OPPOSE*

This bill extends the jurisdiction of the District Court to be concurrent with the courts of probate over matters concerning custody or other parental rights of a child under the M.R.S., Title 18-A, including, but not limited to, adoption, termination of parental rights, change of name and guardianship of a minor. The District Court has exclusive, continuing jurisdiction over a matter concerning custody or other parental rights of a child if an interim or final order concerning the child was entered in the District Court and remains in effect, proceedings seeking such an order are pending in the District Court or a matter has been removed to the District Court from the Probate Court.

This bill provides that, in any matter concerning custody or other parental rights of a child, the judge of the District Court or the probate judge who is presiding require all parties to disclose whether they have knowledge of any interim or final order then in seeking such an order or other related actions currently filed or pending before any court of this or another state. If the proceeding is in a Probate Court and the judge determines that the District Court has exclusive, continuing jurisdiction, the judge of probate must transfer the case to the District Court.

Upon petition by a party to a proceeding involving guardianship, adoption, change of name or other matters concerning custody or other parental rights of a minor child brought in the court of probate, the proceeding may be removed to the District Court under such procedures as the Supreme Judicial Court may be rule provide if any civil matter involving the minor child is pending or has been finally adjudicated in the District Court. Committee voted OTP-AM; Work session reconsidered; Ant. Div. Rep.

LD 1030 – An Act to Better Coordinate the Work of Mental Health Crisis Agencies with Law Enforcement Agencies – HHS

LD 1206 – An Act To Allow County Corrections Officers To Participate in the Retired County and Municipal Law Enforcement Officers and Municipal Firefighters Health Insurance Program presented by Rep. Tucker of Brunswick. SLG SUPPORT

This bill (LD 1206) allows county corrections officers to participate in the Retired County and Municipal Law Enforcement Officers and Municipal Firefighters Health Insurance Program and renames the program and related fund accordingly. Committee voted ONTP at Feb. 10th work session.

<u>LD 1325 – An Act To Ensure a Public Process When Discontinuing or Abandoning a Public Road</u> presented by Rep. Nadeau; cosponsored by Sen. Valentino. **SLG**

This bill changes the laws governing discontinued and abandoned roads.

Under current law, a presumption of abandonment exists if a municipality fails to keep a way passable for the use of motor vehicles at the expense of the municipality for a period of 30 or more years. This bill eliminates that presumption for ways that have not met that statutory requirement by January 1, 2020. Instead, for all other public ways, the bill provides a new discontinuance process, which will be the only means for a municipality to actively terminate its interests in a public way. The new discontinuance process specifies 5 steps a municipality must follow to discontinue a road: the notification of proposed discontinuance to the abutting property owners; a meeting of municipal officers to discuss the proposed discontinuance and the filing of an order of discontinuance specifying whether or not there will be a public easement and any public use restrictions or municipal maintenance and liability responsibilities for the public easement; a public hearing on the discontinuance; approval of the order of discontinuance by the municipal legislative body; and the filing of the certificate of discontinuance by the municipal clerk in the registry of deeds and with the municipality. The bill requires the abutters of a public easement that is discontinued to be granted a right-of-way. The municipality may charge a reasonable fee to fulfill any request for records obtained by the municipality from the registry of deeds.

The bill continues to exempt a municipality from liability for nonperformance of a legal duty with respect to a town or county way that has not been kept passable for the use of motor vehicles at the expense of that municipality for a period of 30 or more years.

It requires that a public easement must be retained in a discontinued road if abutting property owners need to use it to access their property. It also provides that a public utility easement will be in place whenever a road is discontinued, regardless of whether a public easement is retained.

A way that is presumptively abandoned retains a public easement, as is the default position under current law. The bill does not modify common law abandonment.

The bill allows a municipality to prepare a list of all town ways in that municipality that are currently maintained with public funds; a list of all town ways that have been discontinued since 1965 and whether or not a public easement was retained, if known; and a list of all town ways that have been abandoned since 1965 and whether or not a public easement was retained, if known. If a municipality prepares a list, the municipality must publish the list on its publicly accessible website or make copies available at the municipal office, for which the municipality may charge a reasonable fee. The municipality must record the list at the county registry of deeds.

LD 1457 – Resolve, Authorizing the State Tax Assessor To Convey the Interest of the State in Certain Rea Estate in the Unorganized Territory TAX NO POSITION Committee voted OTP-AM

<u>LD 1473 – An Act To Increase Access to Opiate Addiction Treatment in Maine</u> – HHS Sponsored by Sen. Woodsome *SUPPORT*

This bill would increase access to opiate addiction treatment by setting the MaineCare reimbursement rate for outpatient methadone treatment at a level equal to the rates in effect prior to the 2010 and 2012 rate cuts. **Committee voted OTP-AM**

<u>LD 1496 – An Act To Support Maine People in Recovery</u> – HHS Sponsored by Rep. Maker SUPPORT

This bill would provide funding for 3 new centers in different parts of the State to coordinate and run peer support programs to help persons in recovery from drug addiction. Two of these centers would be located outside of Maine's service centers, in order to serve populations in more rural parts of the State. Funding for each center would support the hiring of a coordinator who would support recovery group facilitation, peer mentoring and peer recovery resource connecting, and the centers could be coordinated and housed within existing health care settings, such as rural health care centers.

Committee voted unanimously OTP-AM

<u>LD 1528 – An Act To Modernize and Consolidate Court Facilities</u> – AFA Sponsored by Sen. Valentino SUPPORT

This bill would increase the maximum amount of securities that may be issued by the Maine Governmental Facilities Authority for specific allocation to the judicial branch. The increase would be used to fund projects for court facilities in Waldo, Oxford and York counties.

LD 1537 – An Act To Combat Drug Addiction through Enforcement, Prevention, Treatment and Recovery presented by Senate President Thibodeau, co-sponsored by Speaker Eves and referred to the AFA Committee with C.IPS and HHS.

SUPPORT

The purpose of this bill is to address drug addiction by increasing the number of drug enforcement agents and by increasing the availability of prevention, treatment and recovery programs.

- 1. Part A provides ongoing funding for 10 investigative agents in the Department of Public Safety, Maine Drug Enforcement Agency.
- 2. Part B directs the Department of the Attorney General to administer grants to local law enforcement agencies and county jails located in geographically diverse communities throughout the State to fund projects designed solely to facilitate pathways to community-based treatment, recovery and support services.
- 3. Part C directs the Department of Health and Human Services to provide grants to a substance abuse treatment entity to develop and operate a 10-bed social detoxification center located in the greater Bangor area.
- 4. Part D provides ongoing funding for annual grants to the Maine Association of Substance Abuse Programs for the establishment and expansion of peer support recovery centers and the coordination and provision of substance abuse prevention and education in schools and communities.

- 5. Part E provides funding to increase substance abuse residential treatment and substance abuse outpatient services for the uninsured.
- 6. Part F transfers \$725,000 in fiscal year 2015-16 and \$1,775,000 in fiscal year 2016-17 from the funds received pursuant to the court order in State of Maine v. McGraw-Hill Companies, Inc. and Standard & Poor's Financial Services, LLC, Kennebec County Superior Court Docket No. BCD-CV-14-49, to the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund.

 PUBLIC LAW Ch. 378

LD 1586 – An Act To Implement Recommendations of the Right To Know Advisory Committee Concerning Remote Participation in Public Proceedings – JUD Reported by Rep. Hobbins NO POSITION - March 2 Committee Voted – Divided Report

Part A of this bill allows members of a body subject to the Freedom of Access Act to participate in meetings of the body through telephonic, video, electronic or other similar means of communication under certain conditions; however, the bill does not allow members of publicly elected bodies to participate in public proceedings unless physically present. The body must have adopted a written policy authorizing remote participation with criteria that must be met before a member may participate remotely, but the policy may not allow a member to participate remotely in an executive session of the body. The bill also requires that notice of the proceeding must be given as if no members were participating remotely, each member of the body must be able to hear and speak to all other members, members of the public must be able to hear all members of the body, each member participating remotely must identify anyone else present at the location from which the member is participating, documents or materials discussed or presented at the proceeding must have been received by or transmitted to members participating remotely, and all votes must be taken by roll call vote. A member who is not physically present may not vote in a quasi-judicial proceeding of the body. A quorum of the body must be physically present unless an emergency has been declared and the proceeding is necessary to address the emergency. If the body conducts proceedings with members participating remotely, the body must also hold at least one proceeding annually where no members participate remotely.

Under current law, the following state agencies are authorized to use remote-access technology to conduct meetings: the Finance Authority of Maine, the Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices, the Emergency Medical Services' Board and the Workers' Compensation Board. Part B provides a specific exemption from the new requirements for the Emergency Medical Services' Board and the Workers' Compensation Board and does not affect the existing authority of those agencies or the Finance Authority of Maine or the Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices to use remote-access technology to conduct meetings.

To the Members of the Maine Legislature's Joint Standing Committees of Appropriations & Financial Affairs and Criminal Justice & Public Safety:

Dear Maine Legislators:

I am writing as President of the Maine County Commissioners Association to provide some background information to assist your committees in dealing with the issue of supplemental Jail funding.

We believe that it is important to recognize the statutory role of County Commissioners in connection with County Jail Budgets. Commissioners are responsible by Maine Law, Title 30-A, Sec. 102, for final authority over the operation of all county offices by elected or appointed county officials. I have included below a footnote that provides the full text of Title 30-A. Sec. 102.

We work with the Sheriffs of this State to ensure that the funding the jails receive is administered properly and efficiently. The Sheriffs manage the jails administering budgets that we as County Commissioners, with our municipal budget committees provide final approval. We have worked and continue to work diligently with our Sheriffs to do more with less during these difficult budget times.

The operation of County Jails involves a partnership with the State and the Counties. We are impacted by legislation affecting sentencing and fines; by judicial decisions of State Judges and Prosecutors; and we take care of arrestees from the State Police, the Warden Service, and the Department of Probation, among others.

For the partnership to be successful, it is important that we be at the table and our voices heard. We have the final responsibility to ensure that our County Budgets are balanced. We cannot operate on a deficit basis as a means of doing business. So we ask to include us in discussions concerning funding of our jails. We have much to contribute to this effort and want you to know that it is an important priority for

Maine County Commissioners to see that the State and Counties are successful in ensuring that the system is working for all Maine citizens.

We request your support for the supplemental appropriation of \$2.45 million for each year of the biennium. It is vitally important for the safe and efficient operation of our jails. Thank you for your consideration and your public service to our State.

Title 30-A, §102. County commissioners' authority states: "The county commissioners have final authority over the operation of all county offices by elected or appointed county officials, except in circumstances for which a County Personnel Board has been established under subchapter VII, article 2 with the powers and duties set forth in that article and in section 501. The county commissioners must act as a board and not on an individual basis in exercising this authority."
