## Maine County Commissioners Association Newsletter

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More than 1,500 county officials were in Washington, D.C. February 21–25 to meet with each other and members of the Administration and Congress on key issues like transportation, municipal bonds, the environment and public lands as part of NACo's annual Legislative Conference. Among others, Vice President Joe Biden was a primary speaker. Penobscot County Commissioner Peter Baldacci, Cumberland County Manager Peter Crichton, Cumberland County Assistant Manager Bill Whitten, and MCCA Executive Director Rosemary Kulow represented the interests of Maine counties. They attended educational sessions, workshops and meetings with Maine legislators stressing talking points concerning workforce development and training, jail operations, continued health care funding for those incarcerated but not convicted, continued funding for FEMA and Homeland Security, and continued funding for the Community Development Block Grant Program. Other key federal policy priorities NACo has identified for counties were also discussed.



In a learning expedition called "Small Acts of Courage," the students are learning about the Civil Rights movement through the stories of Portland residents who fought for racial equality in the 1960s.




### New Leadership in Hancock County

The last time a new sheriff took office in Hancock County, 34 years ago, the law enforcement landscape was decidedly different. Technology, drugs, mental health issues — all these things have become everyday factors or tools when it comes to police work, according to Sheriff Scott Kane, who was sworn into his new position on Jan. 1. "I started in 1984 part-time, and the changes from 1984 until now are incredible," Kane said during a recent interview at his office. And part of what Kane has to deal with as sheriff is the county jail, which falls under his oversight. People with mental health issues that might be exacerbated by drugs or first-time offenders who may need help addressing their substance issues often wind up in jail, he said. Some people deserve to be there, Kane said, but some people who get arrested are better off getting back out so they can get the counseling they need. The new sheriff, who has been a certified DARE officer for more than 20 years, said he fully supports recovery programs that can help people get their lives back on track, and that he wants to get more crisis response training for his officers.

Aside from Hancock County, new sheriffs began serving this month in Aroostook, Androscoggin, Penobscot, Somerset, Waldo, Washington and York counties.
