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"Counties are working to reduce the number of people with behavioral health and substance abuse needs in jails across the country," said NACo Executive Director Matt Chase. "This cutting-edge initiative will help counties focus on results and take their efforts to the next level. It will support actionoriented, comprehensive strategies to provide needed services in appropriate settings."



The prevalence of mental illness in jails is now three-to-six times higher than in the general population. Currently, people with mental illnesses number more than 2 million in jails. And counties are spending more for mental health services in jails and getting worse results than community-based programs. Lack of appropriate care means longer jail stays, higher bills for counties and a higher likelihood of recidivism. The initiative will convene representatives from organizations involved in the issue, including county sheriffs, judges, jail administrators, treatment providers, and mental health and substance abuse counselors.


